## Eagle Project - Shadow Boxes



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# September is National Preparedness Month

Stay safe. Here in Oregon, it could not come at a better time. COVID and wildfires have demonstrated how important it is to be prepared. There are several great websites with lists <u>https://www.ready.gov/september</u> as well as the publication *Disaster Preparedness and Response for the American Legion*. (below is an excerpt)

Disaster Kits Recommended by Department of Homeland Security When preparing for a possible emergency situation, it's best to think first about the basics of survival: fresh water, food, clean air, and warmth.

Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:

- Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Prescription medications and glasses
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- Local maps Additional Items to Consider Adding to an Emergency Supply Kit:
- Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a waterproof, portable container
- Cash or traveler's checks and change
- Emergency reference material such as a first aid book or information from www.ready.gov 20 The American Legion
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person (consider additional bedding if you live in a cold-weather climate)

• Complete change of clothing including a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, and sturdy shoes (consider additional clothing if you live in a cold-weather climate)

- Household chlorine bleach and medicine dropper. In an emergency, you can use it to treat water by using 16 drops of regular household liquid bleach per gallon of water (do not use scented, color safe or bleaches with added cleaners)
- Fire Extinguisher
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates and plastic utensils, paper towels
- Paper and pencil
- Books, games, puzzles, or other activities for household members
- Additional Kit Items to Meet Specific Household Needs:
- Prescription medications and glasses
- Infant formula and diapers
- Pet food and extra water for your pet(s)

Disaster kits are available commercially from a variety of sources but can be assembled easily from household supplies or locally available materials.

Every home and business should have at least one kit of sufficient size for every member of the family or employees. Publicizing the importance of having a kit ready should be a major objective for every Legion post across the country
